#### 1. Action Items

### 2. Help Communities Lead

- Help Communities Lead is a collective effort to advance the discussion within Ontario municipal councils on the need for collaboration between the province and municipalities on policies and programming to help build net-zero communities, and deliver economic prosperity, green jobs, energy efficiency, and carbon emission reductions. There are 3 Planning Briefs (geared towards each of the Ministries (Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks; Ministry of Energy and Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing) outlining the municipal asks that align with their respective mandates. There is a sample council report on the overall Help Communities Lead effort as well as a sample resolution.
- The sample resolution is merely a suggestion for a possible resolution, but it is encouraged that it be customized based on what you think may a better approach that would resonate more with your council.
- There is likely to be concern that the province isn't really interested in engaging with
  municipalities. There is however the additional benefit of discussion related to the
  municipal asks identified in the Policy Briefs (and identified by the Ontario Climate
  Caucus via a strategic planning exercise in the first half of 2022) to serve to advance a
  council discussion on municipal climate opportunities available at present and climate
  opportunities that municipalities would need support from the province to advance.
- There was recognition of the challenges related to the lack of provincial climate leadership, however, it was noted that outside of business stakeholders, it is likely that municipal council representatives would have the most likelihood of being able to secure provincial engagement for a discussion on where there may be overlap between the various actions identified as municipal asks and the provincial willingness to work with municipalities to advance. Once an alignment opportunity is identified it would fall to municipal and provincial staff to implement.
- It was suggested that if a council is unwilling to send a message to the province there is the ability to send the resolution to AMO to encourage AMO to help facilitate a more robust dialogue between municipalities and the province.
- It would also be good to identify community and NGOs who have been active in advancing municipal Climate Emergency Declarations and engage them in building support for council discussions on the Help Communities Lead effort.

### 3. Incorporation of Climate Commitments in Senior Management Performance Metrics

- There is significant interest in compiling information from municipalities on which have advancing the inclusion of municipal climate commitments and outputs into senior management performance frameworks.
- Incorporation of Green Human Resources Management (which is often what this action
  is called) is a leading climate accountability practice. It is a logical follow through from a
  council approved climate actions plan. Corporate commitments are a logical starting
  place, but can also include metrics related to implementation of community actions
- There isn't much public information on which municipalities have this in place. There seems to be more transparency in the private sector re climate commitments metrics in senior management performance metrics. Ex. 37% are tying senior leader's compensation to environmental sustainability performance. Deloitte
- It would be helpful to do a scan of who has advanced Green Human Resources Management (which is another term for this action).

# 4. Incorporation of Climate Commitments into Agencies, Board and Commissions' Mandates and Senior Management Performance Metrics

- Many municipalities have struggled to get the necessary support from their utilities relating to implementation of municipal climate action plan.
- Utilities are an example of a critical municipal partner needed to support the implementation of the municipality's climate commitments, but there are many other ABC's that are also likely critical for municipal climate action implementation.

# 6. Assessment of IESO's Pathways to Decarbonization Study From the Perspective of Municipal Climate Action Plans

The Assessment report provides an overview of the gaps observed in IESO's Pathways to
Decarbonization Study and 11 recommendations to improve decarbonization pathway
analysis, focusing on enhancing modelling, analysis, collaboration transparency, and
aligning provincial energy planning with municipal climate action plans.

- The recognition of the very important message municipalities bring to the Ontario energy planning conversation related to the importance of reducing energy demand and advancing economic development and job creation opportunities across all Ontario communities municipalities highlights the importance of municipalities engaging more in these energy planning discussions.
- The report and its recommendations have been shared with Ontario municipal council members, Minister of Energy and staff; Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks and staff, and the IESO executive team.
